How to become a Pétanque England Umpire





Umpires are technical officials that maintain the integrity of our sport and ensure that each game is played to a set of predefined rules and regulations.

This career is especially for those individuals who can make judgments and take quick decisions during the course of a game. Moreover, umpires need to be people-friendly and should be comfortable working in a team along with other umpires and officials.

If you want to become a Pétanque England Umpire and don't have any idea about the process and guidelines, then this brief article is a must-read for you.

What is the role of an umpire?


Pétanque Umpire

The umpire has the authority of a competition and is in charge of the terrain, he/she ensures that each game is conducted according to the rules and regulations.

The umpire makes decisions on faults or measurements. Moreover, the umpire takes into record any incidents of misconduct, awarding penalties as prescribed by the rules, and reporting these directly to the Umpiring Commission.

The umpire's jurisdiction starts from when the players register at the terrain and ends when the competition is complete, which includes the award of any trophies.

Notably, the umpire reports to and acts under the authority of the Umpiring Commission.





What are the levels of PE's umpires?

Pétanque England has predominantly three levels of umpire

- Club
- County
- National

How to become a PE Accredited Umpire?

In-line with CEP/FIPJP guidelines, the Umpiring Commission train, develop, and assess umpires to the highest national level for the top national tournaments.

Later, the umpires who achieve the National level and experience may then be assessed and nominated by the Umpiring Commission for the European Umpire Exam, which is the next step to becoming an International Umpire.





How to become a pétanque Umpire?

The first step in becoming a pétanque umpire is to achieve training at the local level and then seek additional training via Pétanque England's Umpiring Commission.

After doing this, you need to prepare for an exam and assessment to become an accredited umpire. This can be done after you complete the training course.
